GRANT PROGRAM DEADLINE JUNE 30, 2016

At the Bowls USA Annual General Meeting (AGM) it was decided that a Grant Program would be an appropriate way to “give back” to those clubs that support Bowls USA.

The **Mission** of the Grant Program is to provide funds for 100% Bowls USA clubs to promote club development and to assist recruiting and retaining members. Grant funds may be used for projects that are intended to attract new members or to improve the playing experience of the club.

The **Goal** of the program is to allocate funds equally across divisions, if possible. The total amount of grant funds available for 2016 is \$7,500.

Guidelines:

All 100% clubs within a division are eligible for grants.

The grant application deadline is June 30, 2016.

The three-member Grant Committee shall review all grant applications for merit.

Grants may be fully or partially funded based on a review of the proposed project costs and the total number of grant requests.

Grants may be used for projects that are intended to attract new members such as advertising, signage, Open Houses, youth programs, pamphlets and flyers, etc.

Grants may be used for projects to improve the playing experience of the club such as greens improvements, equipment repairs, club house repairs, or rink equipment such as mats, bowls gatherers, score frames, etc.

Grant recipients must submit a follow-up report on the success of the project to the Grant Committee and to the Bowls USA newsletter. Non-receipt of a follow-up report may put the club in jeopardy of receiving further grants.

Umpires Corner

Hi, all. Here's a recent scenario that came my way during the Southwest Division Open, where re-spotting on the center line was a Condition of Play.

As explained by Skip B, a bowl in motion hit the jack, which sent the jack out of the rink of play; however, after knocking the jack out of the head, the bowl was deflected by Lead B without causing any further disturbance in the head. The question was about what options Team A had under those circumstances.

Simple, right? Consult the Laws of the Sport of Bowls, check out your options under Section 2.3., Bowl and Jack Displacement, Law 37.1.3, Displacement of a Bowl in Motion -- issue resolved. Or is it?

According to Law 37.1.3, and if we accept the facts as given to us by Skip B, the options are to place the bowl where the Skip A believes it would have come to rest or declare the end dead.

And this leads us into a discussion of definitions and why it is so important to use the right words when you're describing a situation to an umpire. (And for you umpires out there, why it is so important to ask the right questions before making a ruling.)

A **bowl in motion** is a bowl that has been at rest as part of the head. (See C.16, page 8.) How does a bowl become a bowl at rest? The only way a bowl can become a bowl at rest is if it was at one point during the end delivered by a player. A bowl that is delivered by a player and is on its way to the head is a bowl in its **original course**. (See C.15, page 8.)

The available options to Team A are quite different depending on whether the bowl in question was truly a bowl in motion. In the situation above, Skip A was asked: The bowl that drove the jack out of the head, was it delivered by you? The answer was yes. Next question: And was the bowl on its way to the head, having just been delivered by you, which was deflected by Team B? The answer was yes. Next question: And was the jack knocked out of bounds before the bowl was deflected by Team B? Answer: yes.

These facts completely change the options available. The options available are found in Section 2.3., Bowl and Jack Displacement, Law 37.1., Bowl displacement by another player, and then the options are found in 37.1.1.3.

Skip A in this situation chose to place the bowl where it was believed it would have come to rest.

WORLD BOWLS ONE STEP CLOSER TO OLYMPIC RECOGNITION

On Saturday 30th April 2016, at the European arm of the World Bowls Conference at the Lorne Hotel in Glasgow's West End World Bowls Chief Executive Gary Smith announced that World Bowls has initiated an application for the sport of Lawn Bowls to gain International Olympic Committee recognition.

In order for the IOC to consider recognising a sport, a minimum criteria of 50 countries must be registered with the World Governing Body and on Saturday it was confirmed that 52 countries are now registered with World Bowls.

This development in the application process now means that World Bowls can take the next step in submitting a 40 page questionnaire along with other required documents to the IOC by 31st August 2016.

50 Years of Bowling at Williamsburg May Not Come to an End After All

Earlier this year, the Williamsburg Inn Lawn Bowling Club was informed that Colonial Williamsburg had decided to remove the lawn bowling green behind the Williamsburg Inn as part of the renovation of the Golden Horseshoe Golf Course and its practice areas. Now in its fiftieth year, the green has served the local lawn bowling community well, and has also hosted tournaments for player from a number of other states and occasionally other countries.

Among the activities taking place as the Club bids farewell to the green was a final visit in April of lawn bowlers from Pittsburgh's Frick Park Club for a pairs tournament which they won. Over the past five decades, Frick Park Club members have visited Williamsburg two or three time a year for friendly competitions, occasionally including teams from one or two other regional lawn bowling clubs. The Williamsburg club has also competed on a home-and-home basis with the Pinehurst club. Cont.

Other activities included competitions for the three major Club championships, the Townsend Singles won by Dan Sven Berg, The Eaton-Mahone Pairs won by Charles Wynder and Brac Bracalente, and the Mixed Pairs won by Frances Knight and Phillip Rockafellow. The final competition on the green, held May 7, was the annual Triples Tournament won by Sissy and Pete Hall and Clyde Haulman.

The decision by Colonial Williamsburg presents challenges for the Williamsburg Inn Lawn Bowling Club as we seek to ensure the continuation of lawn bowling in Williamsburg, a tradition that goes back to at least 1720 and one revived by Colonial Williamsburg in the 1950s. It also presents an opportunity to increase the sport's visibility in the community and to expand the number of participants. A number of short-term and long-run options are being explored.

The short-term objective is to keep lawn bowling going while we seek a permanent replacement green. A variety of options exist and the Club is optimistic about being able to complete this season. For the long run, the Club is investigating various options for constructing a permanent replacement green. Not only is there agreement to install artificial turf that the ALBC will have a voice in selecting, but they have agreed to extend the length of the green so that will be within regulation dimensions. The current green is 10' short. The new green is anticipated to be playable in late fall, 2016.

If all of the current activities seem like the ALBC does not care about young people, remember that we are a major retirement destination and the green is owned by the City. 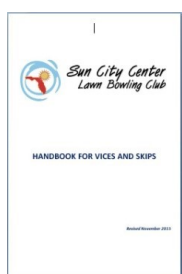
The Club also hosted a team building/introduction to lawn bowling to a group from the City of Clearwater. A good time was had by all.

We lost Bowls USA Hall of Fame member John (Jack) Phillips on April 8, 2016 at the age of 81.

Besides an accomplished lawn bowling career, Jack was very active first in the Central Division where he was Secretary-Treasurer and Councillor and then in the Southeast division as Tournament Director.

At the national level, he was Treasurer of the American Lawn Bowls Association (ALBA) Memorial Foundation, Director of the Super Shots and Director of United States Lawn Bowls Association (USLBA) Marketing. As President of ALBA Jack was instrumental in the merger of ALBA & the American Women's Lawn Bowling Association (AWLBA) to form the USLBA, now Bowls USA.

Jack was the beloved husband of 49 years of Beverly "Fritz" Phillips and brother of Jerry (Marilee) Phillips and Janet Stoer; also survived by nieces and nephews.

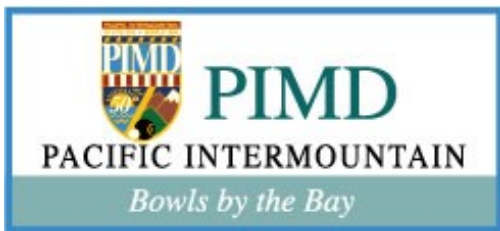

PIMD 2016 Men's Singles Championship

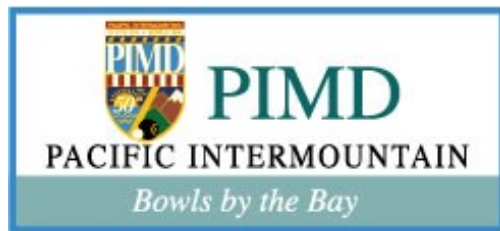


2016 PIMD Open Men's Singles Championship participants

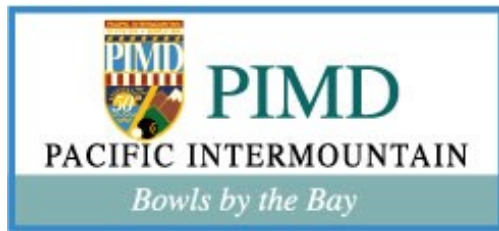

Alhambra Bowls Club

In January, the City of Alhambra's Directory of Community Services, Martin Ray, rather indelicately informed the President of the Alhambra Bowls Club (ABC) that we should expect to be closed by May, 2016, and that there was little we could do about it.

To date, ABC is still open and functioning, we are gaining community support, and we are bringing to light the Alhambra City Council's history of unethical behavior and misuse of federal funds for projects like the parking structure that threatens our greens. It is still an uphill battle to be sure, but we feel like we have a fighting chance now, not only to save our club but to also hold the City accountable for what we believe to be inappropriate use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) money over the decades, money which is meant to help low-and-moderate-income people.

In brief, ABC members as well as homeowners and parishioners of the Lutheran Church next to Almansor Park continue to attend City Council Meetings and voice our concerns as well as plead with the City Council to listen to us and work with us. Since our meeting with the Mayor and City Manager in early March, the rest of the City Council has refused to meet with us personally, and they have all stopped addressing us after we speak at City Council meetings. They have voiced their frustration with our persistence, but we will continue to plead our case until they address our concerns.

The Emmaus Lutheran Church has formally presented the City Council with a proposal to lease their two parking lots for \$1.00 a year for 15 years as an alternative to the multi-level parking structure the City is proposing as long as the City repaves each parking lot for liability purposes. One City Council member publically refused to even accept the hard copy proposal. This gives you an idea of the environment in which we find ourselves.

The City of Alhambra has a history of arguably highly questionable use of federal CDBG money over the years, and we believe the proposed parking structure that now threatens our greens is just another example of the City inappropriately using federal funds for pet projects that don't benefit a majority of Alhambra residents and patrons. Thus, the club, as well as others in the neighborhood, submitted letters of objection to Housing and Urban Development (HUD) regarding the City's proposed use of CDBG funds for a parking structure.

HUD responded to us and has mandated that the City write us letters that address all of our questions and concerns. The letters the City sent in response to our request were, in fact, nonresponsive to the issues raised. In essence, approval of CDBG money is a duel process and we will have to submit our objection letters again if and when the City formally submits the parking structure project for HUD approval. So we will.

We are getting very organized, we do have a strategy moving forward, and we are not just lawn bowlers fighting the City anymore. We are a large group of people and organizations from across Alhambra working together for a common cause.

ABC will continue to keep you posted, and we thank you for all of the support.

Why visitations?

Visitations have been a part of our popular club activities for a long time. They recognize the legitimate competitive needs of club bowlers who do not regularly participate in SWD tournaments. The overwhelming majority of our players bowl primarily, if not exclusively, at Holmby Park. Visitations provide them with an opportunity to compete against bowlers of other clubs and meet new people with comparable interests. However, the impression endures that visitations are only for the so-called "social bowlers".

Visitations are an effective promotional tool as most of the club visitations take place in public parks.

This activity attracts attention, of course, particularly on the weekends. The larger the number of bowlers, the more likely it is that they make a favorable impression on the park users and other passers-by.

Visitations increase bonding with your own club members.

During visitations our members bowl as representatives of our club, fostering club loyalty. Holmby, like every other club, strives to retain current members by making the overall lawn bowling experience more enjoyable for them. We also include novices in our visitation teams because we believe that our novices and 'social bowlers' should have an opportunity to bowl against more experienced players.

Visitations are also in the interest of the tournament bowlers.

Visitations provide an opportunity to observe and learn how other clubs operate.

Finally, but no less importantly, using our greens for large gatherings of bowlers helps to demonstrate to relevant City authorities that the money spent on green maintenance is in the public interest.

Most of us play on greens owned by the respective municipalities. Their budgetary processes demand justification for the substantial expenditure of money required to adequately maintain the greens and any associated facilities (e.g. clubhouse, fencing, etc.). If a 'Cost-Benefit analysis results in a finding that the park space occupied by the greens is underutilized, a municipality may conclude that a disproportionately large amount of money is being spent for the benefit of only a small group of people, a conclusion which may threaten the very existence of the club involved. Alhambra BC's case is a case in point and other clubs have experienced similar difficulties in the past.

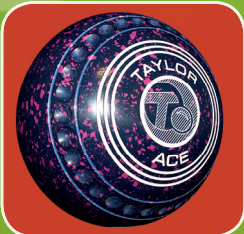

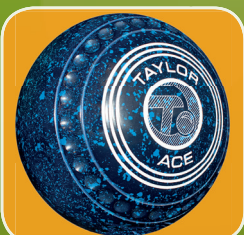

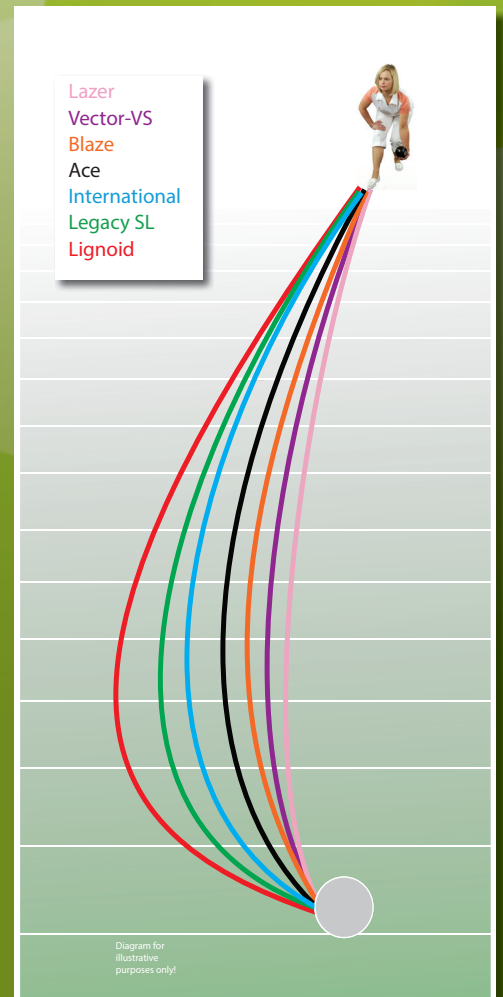
