Distributes Grant Money

At the Bowls USA Annual General Meeting (AGM) held last September, one of the topics of discussion was "loyalty programs" and "incentives" for BUSA clubs. We decided that a Grant Program would be an appropriate way to "give back" to those clubs that support Bowls USA.

A committee, consisting of Councilors Ernie Carlson (NWD), Ginger Harris (PIMD), and Glorianne Mather (CED), was formed to develop and administer the program. We are pleased to report that 20 clubs expressed interest in applying for a Grant, and 13 clubs representing 5 Divisions responded with Grant Requests by the June 30th deadline.

The **Mission** of the Grant Program is to provide funds for 100% Bowls USA clubs to promote club development and to assist recruiting and retaining members. Grant funds may be used for projects that are intended to attract new members or to improve the playing experience of the club.

The total amount of grant funds available for 2016 is \$7,500. After review of all Grant Requests, the Committee has awarded the following grants:

\$200 to Oxnard-Joslyn LBC, SW Division, for newspaper ads, banners, and flyers to support an Open House to attract new members.

\$500 to Long Beach LBC, SW Division, for advertising, pamphlets, banners, yard signs, and booklets to support an Open House to attract new members.

\$500 to Friendly Valley LBC, SW Division, for purchase of two artificial bowling arms to help improve the playing experience of its older members.

\$500 to Sun City Center LBC, SE Division, for advertising brochures to support an Open House, and for purchase of training bowls for novice members.

\$500 to Mount Dora LBC, SE Division, for repairs to their CourtPac greens roller.

\$600 to Lakeland LBC, SE Division, for cleaning and repair of their artificial green.

\$200 to Pinehurst LBC, SE Division, to support three Open House events to attract new members.

\$1,000 to Portland LBC, NW Division, for repair, seeding, top dressing, and fertilizing of their green.

\$750 to King City LBC, NW Division, towards the purchase of an indoor bowling carpet and bowls to provide an alternate bowling venue during inclement weather.

\$550 to Frick Park LBC, NE Division, towards the purchase and repair of a SmithCo greens roller.

\$1,000 to Williamsburg Inn LBC, NE Division, for fees incurred for the use of a temporary green while they seek a permanent replacement green.

\$1,000 to Milwaukie Lake Park LBC, CE Division, towards the purchase of scoreboards for 16 rinks.

Bowls USA is stronger because of the support of all of its members, and we hope that these funds will help 100% clubs share our sport with their communities. We look forward to hearing about clubs' successes in recruiting members and improving their playing conditions. Continuation of this program will be discussed at the upcoming Annual General Meeting to be held before the US Open at Sarasota in November. Questions and comments are welcome!

Umpires Corner

Keeping one's perspective is everything ... in life and in bowls

One of the HDUs suggested that it might help to remind players during announcements (if re-spotting the jack is a Condition of Play) where to re-spot the jack if a bowl is occupying the 2-meter mark. That's a great idea. The HDU then commented that the diagrams in the Laws of the Sport of Bowls are somewhat confusing. So the topic of this article is how to view and/or interpret the diagrams.

Before taking a look at some of them on pages 67 through 70, remember: the **front ditch** is at the opposite end of the rink from the bowler's perspective on the mat. And the **mat line** is at the toes of the bowler on the mat.

Diagram B.2.2 on page 67. There are three dark/bold figures, two called the "Cross bar of a T" and one that is a straight line that says "Piece of suitable material." All three are shown 2 meters out from the front ditch. One of the cross bars is right-side up and the other is upside down.

Now turn to page 68 and diagram B.3. Those same figures now have a jack placed into the diagram at the 2 meter mark. The diagram shows that whether the mark is a cross bar that is right-side up or upside down or a straight line, the jack is placed at the 2 meter mark. The description says, "Nearest portion of the jack to the mat line," and there are a couple of arrows.

And it is right at this point that the reader might be led to think that the arrows are pointing to the mat line. They're not. They can't be. Why? Because it is the front ditch that is shown in this diagram. And so the arrows in diagram B.3. do **not** point to the mat line; rather, they point to the jack. The diagram also illustrates that the jack is *completely* within the 2 meter mark, which is what the description "Nearest portion of the jack to the mat line" is attempting to demonstrate.

So turning to page 70, diagram B.4.2, we now see the rink of play with all of the various parts marked: rear ditch, mat line, front ditch, and then the letters A through G and a description. Perhaps this diagram should have been first in the series and not last. But I digress.

When reading the LSBs, remember: keeping your perspective is everything.

"It is with heavy heart that I inform you (and hopefully our lawn bowling community) that Frank Ransome passed away peacefully Wednesday May 4th. In my opinion Frank did more for lawn bowling than any other single individual in our history."

In Memory of Frank Ransome

Lawn Bowling's "Characters With Character" By Woodruff Ogden

Frank Ransome has dedicated his life to the service of others for the last 50 years. It was in 1987 that he met lawn bowling for the first time at Paradise RV Resort in Arizona. "My first lesson from Paul Johnson, a certified American Lawn Bowls Association (ALBA) instructor, lasted only one-half hour but by 1989 I found myself an assistant to (and often substitute for) ALBA Certified Instructor Dave Close." Frank went on to say, "Dave and I developed a 5 Day Course for newcomers to the trailer park where I lived and graduated 10 to 12 new bowlers every other week for several months."

Frank and his wife Lois, also an avid bowler, moved to Rossmoor, Walnut Creek in July 1989. The two of them immediately joined the Rossmoor Lawn Bowling Club, and Frank polished his coaching skills under the direction of Ed Ribiero, a coach that had moved to Rossmoor from San Francisco. It was in 1991 that he became the official instructor at the Rossmoor club, but his work was just beginning. "I wanted to perfect the 3 Day Course from my Arizona days into a publication all bowlers and bowling coaches should have," Frank tells us. After gathering information from numerous foreign and domestic sources, and incorporating the systems used in Arizona, he published the first comprehensive lawn bowling syllabus for seniors in the U.S. During this period he also wrote the lawn bowling column for the local paper and used that column to recruit new members.

From the year 2000 Frank continued his youth programs in Richmond, visiting clubs in other divisions, working with Brit's Pub to bring lawn bowling to Minneapolis, rewriting his syllabus to include Remedial and the Instructors Courses, publishing the ALBA (USLBA) Lawn Bowl Green's Construction and Maintenance program, and starting two new clubs in Utah. He competed in Utah at the first Huntsman Games featuring lawn bowling where he won gold medals in two events.. Frank tells us, "We have published a Summation of Lawn Bowls Syllabi in which you will learn about training the blind and other physically handicapped bowlers, the Police Athletic League youth program, lawn bowling tips, practice aids and brochures. We have also supplied material to the University of Houston to aid them to include lawn bowling in their physical education program." The Welcome Packet for new bowlers, which has been accepted and used in most USLBA Divisions, is another of Frank's accomplishments.

Frank, when asked for a final commentt responded, "Working with junior bowlers has convinced me that the sport of lawn bowling is truly contagious. Young people that have access to other sports still come to enjoy the camaraderie and the competition of lawn bowling."

Williamsburg Lawn Bowlers Keep the Spirit Alive By Clyde Haberman

Since the decision by the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation to remove the bowling green that has stood for fifty years behind the Williamsburg Inn, the Williamsburg Inn Lawn Bowling Club has endeavored to maintain a presence for lawn bowling in our community. Although membership has dropped with the loss of the green from 62 last year to 39 this year, the Club has remained active and continues to consider options for the long run replacement of the green.

With the help of Colonial Williamsburg, the Club has been able to sustain its weekly Tuesday and Thursday draw program using one of their Har-Tru (rubico) surfaced tennis courts. Being able to locate our locked benches containing bowls and equipment next to the tennis court has been most helpful and while participation in the draw programs is running below previous years, we are hopeful that as the summer goes on and cooler weather returns in the fall more members will come out.

In late June, a group of Club members traveled to Pinehurst, NC to compete in an annual interclub match at the invitation of the Pinehurst Club. A tightly contested competition was tied going into the last match. Although Pinehurst emerged triumphant, we eagerly look forward to a rematch next year and are grateful to our friends at Pinehurst for helping to keep the lawn bowling spirit alive in Williamsburg.

Finally, at the invitation of community leaders from Bowling Green, VA, nine members of the Club participated in the aptly named "Bowling on the Green Virginia Wine Festival." Held on the grounds of the "Old Mansion House," build in 1661 and continuously occupied since, the festival included a makeshift green on the large front lawn area of the mansion. Cont.



The John Brown Friendship Games: Lawn Bowling Competition and Friendship at Their Very Best

Berkeley Partners with Local Youth Program for Bowling Fun





This summer, Berkeley LBC has joined forces with <u>Berkeley Youth Alternatives</u> (BYA), a local community organization that seeks to provide a secure and nurturing environment for children, youth, and their families. Through sports, counseling, educational support and other means, BYA places special emphasis on shifting "children at risk" into "individuals with potential."

BLBC has offered coaching on the basics of lawn bowling as a summer camp activity for BYA participants. Spearheaded by Erwin Vista, one of our Bowls USA-certified coaches (and a grade school teacher off the green), the weekly program puts the FUN back in the fundamentals by using tennis balls as substitutes for bowls and beach balls as substitutes for jacks! The young bowlers are first asked to select blue and gold team names, which happen to be the colors of the two sets of mats we own, as well as the colors of Berkeley. Recent examples have seen the Blue Tornados compete against the Golden Hurricanes. Coach Erwin begins with respect for the facility—"be keen to the green," instructing the kids to walk, not run, to their stations.

On the mat, the drills usually begin with rolling four tennis balls a relatively short distance to where our green ground mats are placed—the team that ends up with most balls on the mat, gets a point in that round, building the basic skill of rolling a limited distance. No need for driving at this level. If you think that's easy, try it someday—you'll be surprised how precise you need to be! Cont.

Other formats include placing a beach ball within a triangle of three bowls and trying to touch it with the rolled tennis ball. To make it even trickier, Coach Erwin has been known to place a few strategic bowls halfway between the mat and the beach ball as "blockers."

If sufficient numbers of players are available, a third game is rolling the tennis ball about 20 feet to a teammate and you only score a point if your team-mate can reach to pick up the ball without removing his/her foot from the mat. Over the course of several rounds or ends, scores are kept—with the prize for the winning team being that they get first choice of (healthy) snacks at the end of the hour. Meanwhile the losers are asked to help with tidying up, but they get snacks too.

Although this may not be "real" bowls, the program has been enthusiastically received by the youngsters and their teachers. And who knows, as Coach Erwin says, one day these youthful fledgling bowlers may look back on this summer and think: "Hey, that was fun—I wonder if there's a lawn bowling green around here?"

Alhambra Bowls Club



Many of you already know that the Alhambra Bowls Club has been fighting the city of Alhambra to remain open. The Alhambra City Council would like to use Community Development Block Grant money to build a multi-level parking structure in Almansor Park and remove lawn bowling from Alhambra in the process.

ABC has been diligently working to save our greens since we found out about the city's plans in January. Since then, ABC has joined forces with the homeowners in the area, the Emmaus Lutheran Church and School, the Alhambra Democrats, and Grassroots Alhambra to prevent the construction of a parking structure in a residential area and the destruction of our lawn bowling greens. Cont.

To date, we are still unsure about the future of lawn bowling in Alhambra, but we have made some progress and remain hopeful that the City will ultimately reverse course and work with the club to enhance lawn bowling in Alhambra rather than remove the sport form the city.

To that end, much has developed since my update in the May 2016 Bowls USA Newsletter. Since then, the *Pasadena Star News* and *Alhambra Source* have published articles about the city's proposed <u>parking structure</u> and the potential <u>loss of lawn bowling</u> in Alhambra. In addition, a new City Manager, Mark Yokoyama, took over in May, and thus far, he seems more willing to work with the lawn bowlers to address our concerns than the previous City Manager.

ABC had a meeting with Mr. Yokoyama in June and he said that the city is currently working on new plans for Almansor Park that would include enhancements to the lawn bowling greens. He said the city is considering several potential options for lawn bowling that include but are not limited to rebuilding the current greens or building the club a new green at a different location. However, he would not provide further details and said that he could not make any promises. So, although hopeful, we remain skeptical until the city actually commits to improving the state of lawn bowling in Alhambra.

The new plans will be presented to the public at the July 25th City Council meeting, which we will all be attending. Supposedly, there will be two or three different plans presented. Thank you all for your support. We will keep you posted. Cont.

We do not know if any of them will adequately address our concerns since the City has not allowed the lawn bowlers or other affected parties a voice in how the city should use the \$8,000,000 in CDBG funds it will receive.

Finally, our coalition has sent letters to county, state, and federal representatives and agencies asking for their intervention. We will continue to fight on as our coalition grows. We hope to induce some positive change in the city. Lord knows, it needs it.

Thank you all for your support. We will keep you posted.

Drake's Pride Bowling Arm

The Friendly Valley Lawn Bowls Club has purchased two bowling arms produced by *Drake's Pride*. These arms have become a popular aid for those individuals who would either like to continue or start bowling but who have difficulty because of ailments, such as painful ankles, knees, and hips; and neck and spinal inflexibility.

Shown in the following photos. The first one shows BowlsUSA Coach Roy McAree demonstrating the use of the device. It may be seen in the upper left quadrant that the jaws of the device are open in the relaxed state.

By squeezing the two handles together, the jaws close to grasp the bowl. It is relatively simple to manipulate in that respect. After gripping a bowl with the jaws and checking the bowl orientation, one makes a few swings back and forth, and then releases the bowl by relaxing their grip on the upper handle.

It will take some practice, of course. Most of the few of us who were willing to try it in front of the crowd of about twenty spectators were at least successful in rolling the bowl several meters, but not necessarily along the intended line. One bowler (not me) did exceptionally well on his second attempt, and rolled it a great distance along the intended line.


